# Thought for the Month

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## ...and the rest!

As I walked to church on St George's Day, it seemed hard to believe that it had only been seven days since I was last making that short trip. It felt as though I had been away for at least double that. Interestingly, when I ran my thoughts passed Lindsey later, she had felt the same.

All we had done was have a few days off – Monday to Saturday – not even a full week but we both felt very rested. Not that we did that much resting as such.

We redecorated the dining room, tidied the garden, made trips to the re-cycling centre, had our dental check-ups, took Daniel to Kilkenny Lane Country Park in Carterton (highly recommended), took Daniel and his friend from school to Blenheim Palace, entertained Daniel's godparents, did our usual weekly shopping and all the other stuff that being a parent/grandparent entails and not forgetting getting trapped in by Virgin Media as they dug up the footpath. But we also did find time to

relax – do some reading, painting and watching TV (and *Rogue One* quite a bit) – and, on reflection, what Lindsey and I decided was that we had got the balance right.

And I hope that I am not simply preaching to myself when I say that finding that balance is seldom easy. Our busy, busy, busy world is constantly piling on the pressure to do more. We're offered breakfasts that we can eat on the go, coffees in take-away (non-recyclable) cups and so-called labour-saving devices that enable you to get more done. Many of us are expected to start work early and/or finish late. Lunch (if we have one) is taken at our work station. We have mobile phones so that we can be on call 24/7 and we check our emails even when we're meant to be off.

We feel obliged to work that extra hour to keep the boss happy. After all, we don't want to be overlooked next time there's a wage increase or promotion and, heaven forbid, we



don't want to be first in line when the boss is looking to restructure or streamline the business. We take on an extra customer even when our order books are full because we don't want to risk turning them away because demand may not always be that good.

From my experience, there is not a lot of difference within church and Christian organisations. There you have the added pressure of "you're not doing it for me; you're doing it for God" or "what sort of witness are you giving when you say 'no' to that person who needs to see you now?"

And so we find what leisure time we do manage to grab is spent catching up on sleep and our time with God is equally squeezed out or He gets a few desperate minutes here and there rather than quality time.

In our Prayer Hour meeting last month, several of us were struck by a verse from the Book of Isaiah:

"This is what the Sovereign LORD, the Holy One of Israel, says: 'In repentance and rest is your salvation, in quietness and trust is your strength,'" (Isaiah 30:15).

Repentance and rest seem strange bedfellows. Repentance clearly has a place in our salvation. We need to recognise that we are sinners if we are to understand

our need for Jesus' death on the cross. But where does rest fit in?

At the start of the chapter, God declares his woe on "the obstinate children" who "carry out plans that are not mine, forming an alliance, but not by my Spirit, heaping sin upon sin; who go down to Egypt without consulting me; who look for help to Pharaoh's protection, to Egypt's shade for refuge" (Isaiah 30:1-2).

Judah was not holding onto the promises of God that He would protect His people. Instead they looked to what seemed like a powerful potential ally for their salvation – Egypt. They put their trust in fallible human shows of strength rather than Almighty God and once more that was to be their downfall.

For the Jews their worries were about who was going to protect them. For us, the concerns are different but the lesson is the same. Are we going to listen to God's plan for our lives or are we going to kow-tow to where the world around us tells us we will find our security?

Jesus made it clear: "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things [food and clothes] will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:33).

# Pupil Voice

As many will know, Hugh and Amy Allen (the administrator at SCBA) go into All Saints' School on Tuesday lunchtimes to run a club, using the 'What's in the Bible?' DVDs. The club is open to all KS2 children, whatever their beliefs. In preparation for the school's forthcoming Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS), Mrs Delaney, the Deputy Head met with some of the children for feedback. Here's what she gleaned.

## What do you enjoy?

- Watching DVD of a Bible story
- Eating your lunch at the same time as watching the DVD
- Activities relate to the DVD
- Every activity is different
- You learn about God and Jesus from the Bible stories
- I can explain what or who I think God is a bit better now, but everyone has their own opinion
- You can see how the Bible stories can teach us something about life today and how they fit into our Christian Values and SEALs
- The DVDs sometimes link to Captain Hugh's assemblies (worship)
- We like activities like playing Bingo with the King's names and building your own church out of cardboard
- When you do an activity it helps the Bible story to stick in your mind a bit more
- Activities are also fun
- It helps us with our sixth 'R' of Respect
- It can be a quiet time when we can think about God
- Although we have seen some of the DVDs before it doesn't matter because you also notice something else and something in a bit more detail or it helps you to think a bit more deeply about something

- It helps us to respect that everyone is entitled to their opinion because Captain Hugh and Amy will show us a DVD and talk about it and do an activity but we think about it for ourselves and we all think differently. They never tell us what we should think.
- I don't think everyone who goes (to Worship Club) believes in God but it doesn't matter because it helps you to think about how you can handle situations a bit like the Bible stories
- We like that it's a 'drop in' club because sometimes you just aren't 'feeling it'

### **What could be improved?**

- I don't like that some children say they are going to Worship Club to jump the dinner queue, then they talk through the DVD and leave before the activity. This means that some children who love going to Worship Club are turned away because there are too many children

(Discussion followed about how this could be resolved and that it probably wouldn't matter in the summer because children will want to eat their packed lunch on the field with their friends so there will be more space in the room).

- Some older children would like to be 'helpers' rather than do the activity because Captain Hugh and Amy sometimes have too many children to help
- Maybe have Worship Club more than once a week, because 'in the eyes of a child a week is a long time'

(Discussion followed about how this wouldn't be fair to Captain Hugh who is a very busy man and he already comes in on a Monday for worship and a Tuesday for Worship Club and visits the 'Little Ones' classrooms. There was also concern for Amy who they think drives over from Wallingford during her lunch break and she couldn't do that twice a week).

## Thy Kingdom Come

Last year the Archbishops of Canterbury and York had an idea to invite Christians from across the Church of England to join a wave of prayer during the days between Ascension and Pentecost – apparently a time when the Church traditionally focuses on prayer. They encouraged everyone to ask for the Holy Spirit to help them be witnesses to Jesus Christ and to pray for others to discover that living faith.

What started as an idea gained momentum and in May 2016 more than 100,000 Christians from different denominations and traditions took part from the UK and across the world. They joined in more than 3,000 events and services to pray for others to come to know Jesus Christ and for God’s kingdom to come.

The time of prayer culminated in six national Beacon Events over Pentecost weekend at cathedrals in different parts of the country. At Winchester demand was so great overflow areas with big screens had to be organized and at Canterbury a live stream was set up for people to join in on the internet. By July it had received 300,000 views.

The response to what was really a simple invitation was astonishing with hundreds of thousands joining in from churches of many denominations and different traditions around the UK and across the world.

Thy Kingdom Come, as it has been called, has now become a global prayer movement – an international and ecumenical call to prayer, embraced by the Roman Catholics, Baptists, Methodists, Pentecostal and Black Majority churches, as well as the Anglican Church.

The hope is that:

- people will commit to pray with God's world-wide family – as a church, individually or as a family;
- churches will hold prayer events, such as 24-7 prayer, prayer stations and prayer walks, across the UK and in other parts of the world;
- people will be empowered through prayer by the Holy Spirit, finding new confidence to be witnesses for Jesus Christ.

As before, the Archbishops have provided a whole stack of resources on their website ([www.thykingdomcome.global](http://www.thykingdomcome.global)) for individuals, families, homegroups and churches, plus loads of inspiring stories and other information.

Ascension Day this year is Thursday, 25th May and Pentecost is Sunday, 4th June.

So how about it?
