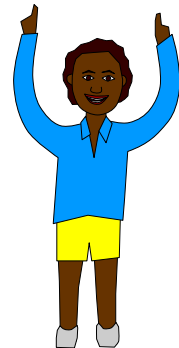

Unfortunately the mixing desk failed to record the sermon on 24th June so here is roughly what I said:

A true story from the early church in North Africa. Around 250AD, the minister of a church by the name of Eucratius had a bit of dilemma. Recently a man had come to faith. We don't know his name (GDPR had obviously kicked in by then) but we do know that he was an actor. That may not seem a problem for us today, but in the time of the early church, dramatics were closely linked with pagan festivals and plays would often be a lead into an

act of worship to some god or idol. It was, therefore, made clear to the man that the church could not be allowed "to be contaminated with such degraded and scandalous behaviour" so he was not welcome while he remained an actor. That seems a bit harsh to our sensitivities today, doesn't it?

Such was the man's new-found faith, that he said, "Fine!" and gave up his work as an actor. However,

he still had to earn a living and his skills lay in dramatics, so instead of acting, he decided to set up a drama school. But that just didn't feel right to Eucratius. If it was wrong to be an actor and engage in pagan celebrations, surely it must be equally wrong to teach others to go down that route.

Eucratius decided to do what any church minister would do. He wrote to his bishop, Cyprian of Carthage, for guidance and received the reply that he was right to be concerned – the man should not be part of the church whether he be the actor himself or teach others to act. But Cyprian didn't leave it there. If the man were to turn his back on drama in all its forms, then Eucratius' church should do their utmost to provide for him until he could find a more suitable profession and, if they felt that they couldn't manage, then Cyprian's church would do so. That is a fine example some two hundred years later of what Luke meant when he wrote, *"All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need"* (Acts 2:44-45).

I guess for a lot of us, the concept of having everything in common is simply beyond our experience. Let's face it, even within marriage, many couples still keep their finances separate from one another. So the thought of having a common purse across a whole church may be beyond our comprehension. We can relate to listening to "the apostles' teaching" (well, we make do with Hugh's), the breaking of bread and prayer but do we have a tendency to almost dismiss having everything in common because that was so First Century!?

Firstly I think that we need to be aware that, while there is a huge difference between the First and Twenty First Centuries, we shouldn't imagine that what Luke described was normal. Back then people still needed to make a living and survive. It was far from the norm to sell everything and put it all in a huge pot for the community. That is why they had such an impact. As Luke reported, *"the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved"* (Acts 2:47). People were so struck by this new way of living that they wanted to join it.

During Jesus' earthly ministry, he was surrounded by images of foreign gods and idols. There were still people engaging in both Greek and Roman mythology and, of course, the Roman emperor was to be regarded as a god. Yet Jesus only ever referred to one by name – Mammon, the god of wealth and riches:

“No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and Mammon” (Matthew 6:24).

The choice that he presented to his disciples was pretty stark: There is no middle ground. It's me or your money. Which one are you going to follow?

In Matthew's gospel, the challenge features as part of the Sermon on the Mount. In Luke's gospel, the parallel passage comes after a parable and Jesus then addressed the Pharisees, *“who loved money”* (Luke 16:14). He told them, *“You are the ones who justify yourselves in the eyes of others, but God knows your hearts. What people value highly is detestable in God's sight”* (Luke 16:15).

Today we are constantly bombarded by adverts for the latest 'must haves'. If we've ever bought something online, unless we've removed the tick from that box, we get regular emails or messages about what we need next from the retailer. If we're feeling down or depressed, we're encouraged to have a bit of 'retail therapy'. We're told that we need to 'dress to impress'. The word that is translated 'detestable' also means 'nauseating'. When we march into the office in our latest outfit, we might receive the admiration of our colleagues but God may be looking down, thinking “You make me sick!”

You can only serve one master. As you look at the world today, who do you think is on the throne – God or Mammon? You see, following Mammon has its effects.

It justifies:

- excessive use of the world's limited resources
- a throw-away culture that leads to increasing pollution
- the exploitation of workers in other parts of the world so we can buy cheap goods
- the turning away of refugees
- the separation of children from their families.

I wonder what would happen if we spent as much time reading Scripture – God’s plan for our lifestyle – as we do looking at adverts, watching lifestyle programmes, trawling the internet for our next planned buy.

While having everything in common might be strange to us, there are groups of Christians around the world who have decided to come together in small communities (not churches) to try to follow the practices of Acts 2 and have written about what they have learnt. It might be impossible for us to copy them but perhaps we can learn from their experiences:

1 They have learnt the importance of budgeting. Just like us, they all have different circumstances so each of them has sat down and worked out their vital outgoings and then, on top of that, they have each allowed themselves the same amount for ‘treats’, whether that be a book, a trip to the theatre, saving for a holiday, etc. Working to a budget seems obvious but it’s surprising how many people get into difficulty because they haven’t planned their finances properly.

2 They have learnt the need to differentiate between their wants and their needs. One group speak of the gap they leave between thinking that they need something and actually buying it – a gap of several days or weeks. In the meantime, they often find a better or cheaper alternative or perhaps discover that their desire fades all together. I wonder how often we have bought something on a whim only to find a few days later that it wasn’t as good as we thought.

3 When starting up, one group sought the advice of some friars. The advice they got was simple: “Don’t consume!” Rather thrown by its simplicity, they asked for clarification how that might work but got the reply, “Just don’t consume!” Of course we do all consume. We eat, we wear clothes, use tools and machines. That’s consuming, but I imagine that what the friars were meaning was think about what you consume. Yes, we all need to eat but do we really need as much as we consume? Do we really need “Man Versus Food”? We need to be clothed

but do we really need bulging wardrobes?

- 4 It's important to know the reason for changing our attitude to wealth and possessions. One group admitted that after a while life lost its joy. Friends described them as "dressing down for the poor". They were leading a simple life but something was missing. That missing thing was a purpose. A simple life was meant to be a means to an end; that end being to live a generous life. Their focus moved from what they went without to what they were able to give away. And joy returned in abundance.
- 5 They also learnt the importance of accountability. By keeping our finances secret, we miss out on one of the most powerful tools against Mammon – one another. Members of the community found that as they talked about their needs and wants they could challenge one another about each other's selfishness and careless spending.
- 6 A common purse also helped them to remove the false sense of power and security that the world places on money.

7 They found that their hearts were realigned from being hoarders to being sharers and their trust was also redirected from money to God.

So what has this to say to the Ladygrove Church today? Well, it clearly is not saying, "Hey Everybody, sell your home and move in with us"! Each one of us needs to weigh up what the Spirit is saying to us individually.

An important lesson, I think we all can learn, though, is to live a generous life. As we say, we're "blessed by God to be a blessing to others" and scripture tells us, "*Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfil the law of Christ*" (Galatians 6:2) and

"If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person?" (1 John 3:17).

We can be generous in so many ways; not just with our money. We can be generous with our possessions, lending them to others when they have a need. We can be generous with our food, inviting others over for a meal.



We can be generous with our time, visiting somebody else or going for a coffee with them. We can be generous with our skills, offering to help someone or teaching them how to do something. We can be generous with our smile. We can be generous with our forgiveness, our acceptance of others and so on. You get the picture – we can all be generous with what God has blessed us with.

But I do need to talk about giving as well. I am not going to talk about tithing – the practice of giving 10% of your income to God. After all, Paul made it clear that, *“each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver”* (2 Corinthians 9:7).

God recognises the different challenges we face with our finances. He wants us to be cheerful

about our giving not feel guilty about it. That again is the work of Mammon.

The reality of our situation, if you missed it at our AGM, is that this year we are facing a £10,000 deficit. We can cope with that in the short-term by drawing from our reserves but we can't go on for too long like that (two or three years?) There isn't that much we can do to reduce our expenditure – stop running Messy Church?

Paul quoted Jesus, *“It is more blessed to give than to receive”* (Acts 20:35).

It is important for each of us to occasionally and prayerfully consider all that God has blessed us with and seek his guidance about what he wants us to do with all he has blessed us with. Perhaps now is a good time.
