Thought for the Month

Climate Change

Not surprisingly, since coming back from holiday I have been asked a number of times whether we had a good time. I have always answered with a resounding "Yes!"

We stayed at the same place as last year — a farm "cottage" in Alsop-en-le-Dale in the Derbyshire Peak District. We went roughly at the same time as last year — end of July/beginning of August. To a large extent we visited the same places as last year — Dovedale, the Tissington Trail and the local National Trust places. And we ate out at the same places. However, the holiday this year felt so much better than it did last year and I think that we have all come back more relaxed and refreshed even though we walked more.

Obviously the one difference was the weather. Last vear two weeks of thunderstorms: this vear – almost two weeks of wall to wall blue sky and sunshine. There is no getting away from it: good weather makes life much more enjoyable and endurable, even when you're walking along a seriously overgrown footpath and up to your chest in stinging nettles because someone has misunderstood the instructions given. Sunshine makes the scenery more vivid, enhances our photography and even makes that glass of rhubarb cider taste even more scrummy.

I guess that the same can be said about us too. Somehow life seems more bearable when we have what people call a sunny disposition. It's not that life is any easier. We still face the same challenges and frustrations that life throws at us but approaching them with good humour seems to help carry us through them. And just as the sun affects us all, so such a person can lift the spirits of those

around him or her. Obviously the opposite also applies.

No wonder Paul identifies joy as part of the fruit of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22). Commenting on that particular quality, one writer has described it





as "a peculiarly Christian grace, which has a much deeper root than mere natural cheerfulness of temper, and is rather the unfailing brightness and equanimity which proceeds from calm and settled principles animated by the Divine Spirit itself" while another said "not a selfish emotion, but a sun whose rays warm and gladden all within the sphere of its influence".

Elsewhere the Epistles see the power of joy. "In all our troubles my joy knows no bounds" (2 Corinthians 7:14). "In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity" (2 Corinthians 8:2). "You suffered along with those in prison and joyfully accepted the confiscation of your property" (Hebrews 10:34).

In times of great persecution, Paul and the new Christians could express happiness in the face of those who sought to bring them down. I bet that must have been a real challenge to the Roman and Jewish authorities who were trying to silence this new movement. Isn't it interesting that when they were facing such hardships, Paul and the others didn't seem to pray that God might deliver them from their oppressors? Rather they seem to accept it with joy. In fact James advised, "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds" (James 1:2). I wonder how that attitude compares to what we pray for when we or others are facing challenges.

Jesus invited us to daily pick up our cross (Luke 9:23). We have never been destined for an easy life. But Spiritinspired joy can pull us through our difficult times as it did the early Church and, in so doing, bring joy to some and a challenge to others. "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him" (Romans 15:13).

Sundays

As you'll be aware, for the last year or so, we have been holding two Worship All Together services each month, partly because we only have a few people who are willing to help with our children's groups and wanted to enable them and the children to engage with the whole church family.

Following discussions with the children's group leaders, it has been decided to return to holding them just once a month so we will revert to the following format:



Week 1	Morning Worship with Children's Groups
Week 2	Communion with Children's Groups
Week 3	Worship All Together followed by Shared Lunch
Week 4	Morning Worship with Children's Groups
Week 5	Communion with Children's Groups

Of course, being the Ladygrove Church, there will be times when we amend the format just a little, such as this month (see below). Also during the main school holidays, we will worship all together.



As well as increasing the number of children's group meetings, we are making a few other changes too. Firstly, when they go out all children will start together in what was the Children's Centre (turn left out of the school hall and first left) before they break up in age groups and go to various rooms. Secondly, we hope to introduce a bit more sung worship into our ministry with children and, thirdly, we'll be using some excellent material called Energize produced by an organisation called Urban Saints (formerly Crusaders, if you're old enough to remember them). The material is not syllabus-based like the Scripture Union material that we have used in the past but rather offers lots of resources for various topics and Bible readings. This will enable all the groups to look at the same Bible reading as those remaining in the school hall but in a more age-appropriate way; thus providing a greater opportunity to talk about what we've all been learning around the table at Sunday lunch.

This month we are starting a sermon series on the Book of Exodus, looking at the Israelites' journey from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land

Toast and Desert

On **23rd September** we are going to do something a little different.

During September, a local charity called Homeless Oxfordshire is inviting people to find out more about the challenges of homelessness in their local community. On that Sunday our reading is about the Israelites' journey in the desert so it seemed an appropriate day to accept the invitation. Our very own Erica Young, who works for South Oxfordshire and the Vale of the White Horse District Councils will be sharing her insights into the situation in Didcot and district. The children will also be able to learn a little more about homelessness in their groups.

And where does the toast fit in? Well, anyone who visits Homeless Oxfordshire is offered a breakfast of tea and buttered toast so we thought that we'd join them by starting the service in a similar fashion (including gluten- and dairy-free options!)

Of course, there will be an opportunity to make a donation towards the work of Homeless Oxfordshire.



Baptism

On **Sunday**, **30th September**, rather than a second communion service, we will be joined by family and friends of Frankie and Anna Tipton to celebrate their son Frasier's baptism. After the service, Frankie and Anna have invited us all to join them for a shared lunch in the Community Hall.



The Ladygrove Church has been running Messy Church for six years but at a recent meeting where we reflected on what God has done in that time, we realised that we have never actually featured an article about it in our magazine, so here it is.

It all started at an Anglican church near Portsmouth in 2004. The church had good facilities and the area needed as much community-building as possible. There was a lot of sympathy towards church but it wasn't offering anything that really gripped the imagination of local families. A few people got together and decided to try to do something for all ages together, partly out of a belief that we grow best as a church when we walk the journey with as many different people as possible, and partly from a desire to help families to grow together in their walk of faith, and not see Christianity as something you grow out of when you're eleven. Messy Church was born and now they have sprouted all over the world and across the various denominations.

Messy Church is a way of creating church family and involving fun in our walk with God. It is not just for children. It is a church (not a craft club or a stepping stone to "proper church") which helps people encounter Jesus as Lord and Saviour. And its values are about being Christ-centred, for all ages, based on creativity, hospitality and celebration.



A small number of us meet once a month to plan the following Messy Church just as we do for our Worship All Together. Focusing on a particular Bible story or aspect of the Christian faith, we come up with 6-7 relevant craft activities suitable for all ages.

On the day, we set up beforehand just as we do for our Sunday morning worship but we set up 7 or 8 tables with chairs around them. The meeting starts with about 1½ hours of craft activities.

There is a volunteer at each table to help everyone with the craft but also to talk with them, ask how they are, share with them and explain what the craft is about. There is also a puzzle or quiz or two for those who prefer to do something with their minds rather than their hands. And refreshments are available throughout the time. Ideally it would be good to have one or two people around just to chat while people are enjoying



a cuppa but we tend not to have enough volunteers for that at the moment.

At about 4.15pm, we push the tables to the side and bring the chairs into the centre. We sing a hymn, we have notices and celebrate people's birthdays just like we do on a Sunday. We look at the things that people made, we have a Bible story and have a talk. We have a time of prayer, concluding with the Lord's Prayer and then finish possibly with another hymn before going into the Community Hall for a shared meal



and more opportunity for fellowship together.



Meeting just once a month (and not in August) we don't have so much contact with people but some of the conversations that we have with people have been quite exciting and it is encouraging to see how people have grown in their faith.

If you would like to know more or would like to get involved, speak to one of the team – Ruth Blampied, Pat Clay, Mary and Martin Parker, Teresa Sargison, Rachel Tillyer or Clare-Louise Wiblin. Until now we have usually been hosting our monthly Messy Church on the second Saturday of the month, but from October we will be meeting on the third Saturday each month.

Emmaus Course


"It's been a bit like discovering a new friend who, actually, has always been there with me".

That's what one person said at the completion of an Emmaus Course at our church. For me, that is one of the greatest strengths of Emmaus compared to other similar courses – it engages with you where you are, rather than dictating where you need to start from, and does not expect you to have any particular level of knowledge. Over fifteen weeks it looks at the basics of Christian belief, how Christians grow and how Christians are called to live but always from a point of your experience of life and faith.

The course is designed for those who might be asking questions about faith and spirituality, those who are new to the Christian faith or those who are looking for a "refresher".

Each session includes a mixture of film clips, discussions, a look at the Bible, occasional activities and individual reflection. No question is too hard, too simple or out of bounds. No pressure is put on anyone to engage with the course any deeper than they wish to. And if you conclude that it is not for you, that's fine. You can drop out, no questions asked.

The next Emmaus Course will be kicking off on Tuesday evenings, starting on **25th September**. If you are interested in coming along, please let Hugh know. Or perhaps, you might know someone who would be interested - why not invite them and come along with them?

And, more importantly, who knows what effect that message from God's word has been having on at least five people?
